


Nicklaus, Miller, Weiskopf, and the 1975 Cliffhanger at Augusta: An Unforgettable Masters Tournament

Miller had a birdie putt to win the tournament, but he missed. Weiskopf then had a chance to force a playoff, but his birdie putt also lipped out.


Nicklaus had a 15-foot birdie putt to win the Masters. He took a deep breath and drained the putt, sending the crowd into a frenzy.


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
